





MAT can successfully treat OUD



Increased access to MAT can reduce overdose deaths by **80 percent**.^{1,2}



Opioid overdose deaths dropped **61 percent** post-incarceration for inmates treated with MAT.³




OUD patients treated with medication are more likely to remain in therapy compared with patients whose treatment did not include medication.⁴




Long-term MAT for youth has significant benefits.⁵

More clinicians are needed to get more patients treated.



Only **49 percent** of people with opioid use disorder have access to a MAT-trained doctor.⁶



More than two-thirds of U.S. clinics and treatment centers do not offer buprenorphine, methadone or naltrexone, and many refuse to admit people who are taking them.⁷
